Dear Doctor DeLaney:

I have just received your letter of 8 December and am very sorry to hear that you are not pleased with your present assignment.

When you were in the Bureau in May, I made a note on your card that you would prefer assignment to duty in a cruiser or carrier. At the time you were nominated for duty with the 3rd Fleet, no such billet was available and you were ordered to Commander 3rd Fleet for assignment where a large number of medical officers are required for replacements and emergency assignment. As you know, this Bureau has no control over the further assignment of medical officers within that Command. I would suggest that you take up the matter of your assignment to a large combatant ship with your Force Medical Officer, and I feel sure that such a request would receive due consideration upon completion of your present duty.

I know Doctor Fielding very well, having attended medical school with him, and I feel sure that he will be glad to help you in any way that he can. If you are still working with him, please give him my regards.
